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**Course ID:** 107711      **Description:** Introduction to Peace and Conflicts

**Full Course Description:** The Foundation Course in Peace and Conflict Studies is designed to engage students in an examination of the major contemporary challenges to peace, sources of conflict and violence and several key nonviolent mechanisms for conflict transformation and prevention. During the course, an understanding of the complex and interconnected challenges to peace will be developed, as will an understanding of the need for multi-faceted approaches to meet these challenges. Participants in the course will engage critically with various theories of conflict and violence. They will develop their understandings of the theoretical resources available in the area of peace and conflict studies as will as their

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**Course ID:** 107712      **Description:** Practices of Conflict and Management

**Full Course Description:** This course examines the changing nature of contemporary conflict and the practices techniques used in conflict management. It engages the question of the roots of conflict in greater depth and also explores the range of options for responding to conflict including negotiations, conflict resolution activities, in the role of the UN, the role of peace operations and the challenges of peace building activities. A primary focus of the course is an examination of the capacity and potential of various cultural conflict resolution and transformation practices. The course also covers trigger events, ripeness theory, feature of effective and ineffective peace process, and post conflict justice and r

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**Course ID:** 107713      **Description:** Hard and Soft Conflicts in the Middle East

**Full Course Description:** This course is a survey of actual cases of conflicts such as territorial disputes, insurgency, resurgence, guerrilla war, international war, nuclear proliferation and terrorism as well as soft conflicts such as environmental issues, water, refugees and intellectual rights.

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**Course ID:** 107714      **Description:** Strategic and Security Studies in the Arab World

**Full Course Description:** This course deals with the different concepts of strategy with special emphasis on their development, in particular, in the aftermath of the cold war period. it also deals with those concepts on a local , regional and international level to the relative view of the concepts between great, middle and small states, it deals with the challenges facing the nation states and the strategies to approach them.

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**Course ID:** 107715      **Description:** Islamic Perspective of Peace and Conflict Resolution

**Full Course Description:** This course is an advanced survey intended to introduce students to a sampling of peace concepts, theories and approaches of conflict resolution from an Islamic perspective. It deals with the Islamic perspective to violence, terrorism, war and other related issues of international wars and disputes and tools of peace reconciliation.

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**Course ID:** 107717      **Description:** Water, Security and Peace in Jordan

**Full Course Description:** This course will explore conflict, insecurity and collaboration in relation to scarcity, poor quality, and variability of freshwater resources in Jordan. An overview will be provided of current and projected future state of freshwater resources. Students will examine disputes and conflict over access to fresh water resources and rivers, including dam construction in the region. Throughout the course, mechanisms and instruments will be introduced to assist the resolution and prevention of water-related conflict and insecurity including, international law, institutional arrangements, policy reform, dispute resolution, track-two dialogues, environmental monitoring systems, early warning system

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**Course ID:** 107721      **Description:** Research Methods

**Full Course Description:** This course develops students theoretical knowledge and applied skills in conducting qualitative, quantitative and participatory research in the social sciences. It addresses, inter alia; epistemology, critical theory, research ethics and project development and grant writing. The course serves to prepare for the design and writing of the major research project required for their degree through the development of their abilities to formulate research problems and proposals and to conduct research.

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**Course ID:** 107731      **Description:** Multiculturalism

**Full Course Description:** The major assumption of this course is that humans can learn and change their acquired behaviors and beliefs. Human behavior is mostly transmitted from one generation to another via cultural means of socializations (for example, militarization and education are essential institutions in this context). Categorization and identify labeling is one of these powerful means to establish boundaries and justify both violence and cooperative relationship. 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**Course ID:** 107751      **Description:** Sustainable Development in the Arab World

**Full Course Description:** This course explores the concept of sustainable development. The three pillars of sustainable development - economic development, environmental protection, and social development - will be introduced. Basic concepts of ecological economics cost-benefit valuation techniques will be presented and applied. The roles of local people, government, and private, national, and bilateral aid agencies will be examined as constraints against the implementation of sustainable development models. Sustainability issues related to the Middle East, such as aging of populations, sustainable consumption, institutional adjustments, and managing growth, will be emphasized.

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**Course ID:** 107771      **Description:** Jordan Law and Societal and Organizational Conflicts

**Full Course Description:** This course is intended to introduce students to a sampling of conceptual approaches, theories and models constructed to help interpret and make sense of Jordan's law and various types of societal and organizational conflicts including actual cases of refugees, investments, child labor, international labor and international criminals; It reviews Jordan's model of law and justice in these areas of research.

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**Course ID:** 107799      **Description:** Thesis

The students prepare a research project prior to the third semester of his/her study. Upon approval of his/her supervisor, the student proceeds with his/her research, analysis of results, and writhing final thesis. The student defends his/her research in the presence of an assigned examining committee. Also, the student is required to attend 3 credit hours training at one of the governmental, nongovernmental, and international organizations which are related to his/her researc
