The focus will be on important literary works produced by important classical writers such as Homer and Virgil. Other writers might be included. Students are also expected to discuss important concepts relating to Greek and Roman mythology.

	This course mainly examines literature written in the 20th century by English and American writers within socio-political and historical contexts. Full Course Description: Couse ID: 1714031460	The course is a response to the digital technologies that are changing all aspects of how we access, analyze, and conceptualize information. This course investigates how this technology and the "information culture" it produces affect the way we read, study, and understand literature. The course aims to answer some of the following questions: What happens to literature and "the literary" in an age of digital technology? And, what is digital literature and how do we contextualize it within a history of literature and literary aesthetic? Since in recent times there is a gap between literature and the new media that have enhanced tradition and aesthetic of print literature along with the Web and authoring programs that have stimulated creative outbursts of experimentation in narrative and poetic forms. The course is an introductory course that examines a varied collection of electronic literature and genres in order to understand the current state of this new literary field and its relation to print literature and traditional concepts of literary study.

	The course concentrates on introducing the successive ages of English literature from the Anglo-Saxon period till modern times by giving introductions to each age outlining its nature, characteristics and orientations, so as to acquaint students with English literature through a general survey of its successive ages.	
Couse ID: 1714032353	Description: Comparative Cultural Studies	
	The course starts with a general introduction to the term "Culture", followed by a survey of the characteristics of Arab and European cultures with special emphasis on the linguistic, religious, and historical constituents of both cultures. A comparative study will be done between the two to highlight the characteristics of each culture.	
Couse ID: 1714032354	Description: Arabic Literature	
	This course deals with the development and the characteristics of modern Arabic poetry. It examines the factors that influenced its development through focusing on the major poets of the various poetic schools, such as al-Baroudi and Shawqi from the Renaissance group, the Mahjar poets, the Apollo group, and the school of free verse which was developed by al-Malaikah' and al-Sayyab. Each phase of modern poetry will be represented by poems that reflect the characteristics of modernism in Arabic poetry.

Full Course Description: In this course, students read and analyze texts by major American and African-American writers in socio-political and historical contexts. This course covers some of the major developments in American literature between and after World Wars I and II, examining forms of experimentation and representation in some canonical texts as well as the relationship between American and African-American forms of modernism. Therefore, the course surveys representative writings by modernist American and African-American writers and covers notions like the "roaring twenties," the "Jazz Age," the "New Negro," and the "Harlem Renaissance." Organized around several interrelated themes, the course will investigate questions of nativism and ethnic identity, language and modernism, literary subgenres, popular vs. high culture, aesthetic innovation, the modernist reimagining of regional roots, ... etc. Writers examined include, but are not limited to, Fitzgerald, Hemingway, Faulkner, Steinbeck, Thurman, Hughes, Hurston, Larsen, among many others
